

Narrator: Listening Part 2. Read the sentences first. Listen and circle the correct word. There is one example. You have 30 seconds to read the sentences. [30 seconds]

Mona: Hi, Sara. My mum bought me a new pencil case at the shop yesterday.
Sara: That's amazing. My dad bought me a new ruler.
Mona: That's exciting. Let's measure things.
Sara: Great idea. Let's measure your pencil case first.
Mona: Okay...Can I use your ruler?
Sara: Sure. Of course.
Mona: What a surprise! My pencil case is shorter than your ruler. My pencil case is 15cm long.
Sara: Really? How wide is it?

Mona: I think it's 4cm wide. I can put all my coloured pencils in it.
Sara: Haha. You do have a lot of coloured pencils.
Mona: What are these?
Sara: Oh! Those are my paintbrushes. I know they are 1cm wide.
Mona: 1cm! They are very wide. How long are your paintbrushes?
Sara: I think they are 10cm long. Let's measure and check...
Mona: Yes, you are right they are 10cm long.

Mona: Great. They can fit in my new pencil case!
Sara: Hey! They're my paintbrushes.

Aisha: Hello, Hessa. It's the school summer holiday soon. I'm going to Mexico.

Hessa: That sounds exciting. I'm going to Egypt.

Aisha: Egypt sounds interesting. Have you been to the United Kingdom? Hessa: I used to go there on holiday, but it's too cold! [repeat]

Narrator: Four. What does Fatima have to do next?

Fatima: Hi, Moza. I'm so busy. Can you help me?
Moza: Of course, Fatima. I always help my sisters. Do you have to do your homework?
Fatima: No, I finished my homework and I practised my English.
Moza: Well done. What do you have to do next?
Fatima: It's lunchtime. Mum said I have to lay the table.
Moza: Okay, let's do it together.

Listening: Part 2

Narrator: Listening Part 2. Listen to a teacher talking about interesting facts and circle the correct answer. There is one example. First, you have thirty seconds to look at the questions and sentences. [30 seconds]

Narrator: Example: How much can an owl turn its head?

Teacher: Good morning children, today we are talking about interesting facts. Did you know that an owl can turn its head 270 degrees? So, it can see very well.

[pause 10 seconds]

Narrator: The answer is B. There is a circle around B. Now you listen and circle the best answer.

Narrator: Five. Who invented an artificial leg?

Teacher: In 1928, Peter Markus invented a new life jacket. In 2013, Adeeb Al Baloushi invented an artificial leg. [pause 10 seconds]

Narrator: Six. How many horns did the Triceratops have?

Teacher: Triceratops is one of the most famous dinosaurs. It ate plants and berries. It had three horns. It had two long horns above the eyes and one horn was its nose.

[pause seconds]

Narrator: Seven. What did the Allosaurus eat?

Teacher: The Allosaurus wasn't a herbivore, so it didn't eat leaves and sticks from small plants and trees. The Allosaurus was a carnivore, so it ate other animals like lizards and turtles. [pause 10 seconds]

Narrator: Eight. What did they use for carrying messages in Egypt?

Teacher: In ancient times, there were no phones. In Egypt people used pigeons to carry messages. In China, they used runners to carry messages. They were people who could run very fast. [pause 10 seconds]

Narrator: **Now, listen again.** [repeat audio from 5 onwards.]
